Rotary always stands against harming and displacing civilian populations and using armed aggression instead of pursuing peaceful solutions. We advocate for the observance and respect of international law. We believe in strong action to defend and promote peace, even in the darkest of times.

But we also take our position as an international, nonpolitical, nonreligious organization seriously. To respect the global perspectives and experiences of our members, and to work most effectively in our peacebuilding efforts, we do not choose sides in conflicts.

Rotary is made up of 1.4 million people in communities all over the globe who are united in our commitment to building a peaceful world. We strive to ensure that our words and actions prioritize the health and safety of our global membership and the communities where we live and serve.

Our members seek to offer humanitarian assistance to those affected by conflict, and our global reach requires that we promote peacebuilding and conflict prevention with cross-cultural, cross-border connections and friendship through Rotary.

For decades, Rotary has harnessed these connections to carry out service projects, support peace fellowships and scholarships, and establish programs like Rotary Peace Centers to help build lasting peace. Our members also take action to promote Positive Peace, addressing the underlying causes of conflict, including poverty, discrimination, ethnic tension, lack of access to education, and unequal distribution of resources.

Rotary members who wish to wage peace can use district grants and Rotary Foundation global grants to support projects with other Rotary members that help refugees and displaced people, provide medical support, and more worldwide. Members can also work with or join peace-focused Rotary Action Groups, Friendship Exchanges, Fellowships, and intercountry committees. And District Designated Funds or district cash can support our peacebuilding and conflict prevention efforts.

Members and nonmembers alike can learn more about peacebuilding through the Rotary Positive Peace Academy, a free online course available to anyone with an internet connection. You can find it at positivepeace.academy/rotary.

There is no denying that incidents of violence and atrocities being perpetuated around the world seem to be escalating. Global peace is fragile, and the stakes are getting higher.

Still, we know that it is possible to bring all people together to work toward a shared goal. Rotary members do so every day in every part of the world. May our ability to unify in common purpose be a spark that helps light the path out of these dark days. Together, let's Create Hope in the World.

The Vocational Service Month

In vocational service, we are serving others by using our unique skills to address community needs. We empower others through training and skill development while inspiring them to act with integrity by following Rotary's guiding principles.



Connecting our professions and professional networks with our club activities is one of our vocational services. We use our expertise to address community problems and help others discover new vocational opportunities and interests. We also promote Rotary's commitment to integrity in our professional and personal lives in addition to recognize and advance the worthiness of all professions.

INTEGRITY & ETHICS

Rotary emphasizes integrity and high ethical standards. Two standards developed by Rotarians — The Four-Way Test and the Rotarian Code of Conduct — provide a road map for ethical behavior in the workplace and other areas of life.

THE HISTORY OF THE FOUR-WAY TEST

The Four-Way Test was conceived in 1932 by businessman Herbert J. Taylor, a member of the Rotary Club of Chicago, Illinois, USA, who served as Rotary International president in 1954-55. Having taken on the task of saving a company from bankruptcy, Taylor developed the test as an ethical guide to follow in all business matters. The company's survival was credited to this simple philosophy. Adopted by Rotary International in 1934, The Four-Way Test remains an essential standard against which Rotarians measure ethical behavior. It has been translated into dozens of languages and promoted by Rotarians worldwide.

ROTARIAN CODE OF CONDUCT

The Rotarian Code of Conduct provides a framework for ethical behavior that all Rotarians can use, together with The Four-Way Test, in their business and professional activities. As part of Rotary's guiding principles and the Avenues of Service, Vocational Service calls on Rotarians to empower others by using their unique skills and expertise to address community needs and help others discover new professional opportunities and interests. This handbook can help you gain a better understanding of vocational service and provide you with ideas to practice it through your service activities, in your personal life, and in your career.

- 1. Is it the TRUTH?
- 2. Is it FAIR to all concerned?
- 3. Will it build GOODWILL and BETTER FRIENDSHIPS?
- 4. Will it be BENEFICIAL to all concerned?

ROTARIAN CODE OF CONDUCT

As a Rotarian, I will

- 1. Act with integrity and high ethical standards In my personal and professional life
- 2. Deal fairly with others and treat them and their occupations with respect
- 3. Use my professional skills through Rotary to mentor young people, help those with special needs, and improve people's quality of life in my community and in the world
- 4. Avoid behavior that reflects adversely on Rotary or other Rotarians

BIKE TO SCHOOL & ADOPT A SCHOOL

ROTARY CLUB OF SENTOSA

17 - 20 January 2024 Siem Reap, Cambodia

We embarked on a project called Adopt-A-School (AAS) Program in which we would revisit the schools in which we had built toilets and adopt them in phases. This was with a view to fulfilling the requirements we discovered during the needs assessment phase.

These included:

- 1. Establishment of Digital Labs
- 2. Bicycle Distribution
- 3. Oral Hygiene & Maintenance
- 4. Building of fruit orchards
- 6. Distribution of educational materials, footwear, clothing and sports equipment

We dug into the notes of our audit in September 2022 and decided to adopt three schools in the first year of our Adopt-A-School Program.

They are:

- · Khunream Secondary School
- · Duon Keo Secondary School
- · Prey Chrouk Primary School

We carried out all the distributions of oral hygiene materials, educational materials and footwear in our time there. We also helped build a fruit orchard in Duon Keo Secondary School.

BIKE TO SCHOOL & ADOPT A SCHOOL

17 - 20 January 2024 Siem Reap, Cambodia

On 19th January 2024, we distributed 1,171 bicycles at the Provincial Teachers Training College (PTTC) to more than a hundred schools in the Pouk and Bantasrey districts of Siem Reap. This year we were joined in our bicycle project by the Rotary Club of Jamestown, New York (District 7090). This gave our project a global flavour and reach. Representing the club that donated 58 bicycles were Rotarians David and Marissa Troxell.

The event was graced by Mr. Yun Linne, the Deputy Provincial Governor of Siem Reap and many other officials from the education arena, both from district and provincial levels.

We aim to build on our projects and continue to scale our WASH projects rapidly while simultaneously recircling to our schools to ensure that we deliver sustainable initiatives to enhance the students' educational experience.

It is easy to separate the Bike-to-School Project, the WASH Project and the Digital Literacy Project under the Adopt-A-School Program as three distinct projects. The Rotary Club of Sentosa, Singapore prefers to view this as a seamless approach that supports, empowers, and promotes EDUCATION in Siem Reap Province.

We aim to transform the EDUCATION landscape in Siem Reap, Cambodia, by making transportation access to school easier, affording better access to health, sanitation and drinking water, and raising the bar for schools by bringing them into the digital era.

We invite our fellow Rotarians worldwide to come join us in this meaningful project.


